

Instructions for Authors

Nationalism and Ethnic Politics is a refereed journal. The editors welcome articles, from a variety of methodological approaches, on ethnicity and nationalism, including ethnic identity formation, mobilization, competition, conflict and accommodation. The journal is also open to studies of related subjects, such as immigration, citizenship, and the connection between ethnicity and religion, race, language, class, economic development, and the external environment.

Submission of Manuscripts. There is no standard length for articles but 11,000 words (including notes and references) is a useful target. The article should begin with an indented and italicized abstract of around 100 words, which describe the main arguments and conclusions of the article, and a list of 5- 6 key words. On a separate cover sheet, the following should be included: details of the author's institutional affiliation, full address and contact information, the exact length of the article, brief biographical description (about 50 words), and any acknowledgments. Each manuscript should be submitted in triplicate along with a disk, or sent electronically to the editor: William Safran, Department of Political Science, University of Colorado, CB 333, Boulder, CO 80309, USA, safran@colorado.edu.

Each manuscript must be accompanied by a statement that it has not been published elsewhere and that it has not been submitted simultaneously for publication elsewhere. Authors are responsible for obtaining permission to reproduce copyrighted material from other sources and are required to sign an agreement for the transfer of copyright to the publisher. All accepted manuscripts, artwork, and photographs become the property of the publisher.

Style. Spelling and punctuation: American spelling throughout, with '-ize' endings (not '-ise').

Quotation marks: American style, double quotes around simple quotations, and internal quotes use single, i.e., John replied: "I told him, 'Don't mess with me,' and he decided not to."

Dates and numbers: 12 July 1973; 1983-84, the 1930s (not 'the thirties'), the twentieth century.

Abbreviate Aug. to Feb.; spell out March to July.

Capitalization: use capitals sparingly. Use for titles (President Chiluba) and for unique institutions (the Central Committee, the Knesset, but lower case for provincial organs and lower- grade offices. Capitalize left as a noun (the French Left), otherwise lower case (left-wing politicians). Capitalize Eastern Europe, the West and Western bloc (as political entities). Capitalize communist, socialist etc. only in titles.

Tables and Figures. Tables and figures should not be embedded in the text, but should be included as separate sheets or files. Each table and figure must be followed by a heading, and be referred to in the text. Tables should be kept to a minimum and contain only essential data, and should be consecutively numbered. Any diagrams or maps should be copied to separate files in uncompressed TIF, EPS, or PSD formats. Captions should be typed, double-spaced, on a separate sheet. All original figures should be clearly marked in pencil on the reverse side with the number, author's name, and top edge indicated. Color figures will not be accepted.

References. Notes should be numbered consecutively through the article with a raised Arabic numeral corresponding to the list of notes placed at the end. (References in author-date style are not acceptable.) For example:

Subsequent references: *Ibid.* (if next note), Smith, p.* (for subsequent notes).

Page proofs. All proofs must be corrected and returned to the publisher. If the proofs are not returned within the allotted time, the editor will proofread the article and it will be printed per the editor's instructions. Only corrections of factual and typographical errors are permitted.

Reprints. Each corresponding author will receive one copy of the issue in which the article appears. Reprints of individual articles are available for order at the time authors review page proofs. A discount on reprints is available to authors who order before print publication.
