The *Journal of Sport & Tourism* is a multidisciplinary publication that publishes high quality articles on all aspects of the relationship between sport and tourism. It welcomes submissions from all relevant subject areas, such as sport, leisure, physical education and tourism, and from a wide range of disciplines including, but not confined to: sociology, psychology, geography, policy studies, management studies, economics and marketing. Submissions may be empirical or conceptual, but should have a clearly articulated theoretical basis.

JS&T takes an inclusive and wide-ranging view of the definitions of both sport and tourism, and therefore considers professional and amateur, competitive and non-competitive, social, recreational, and informal activities, as well as leisure, business, and day-trip tourism, to fall within its scope. The journal is interested in tourism incorporating any form of sporting interest, not just tourism to actively participate in sport. Consequently, manuscripts relating to tourism where sport is a subsidiary interest or activity are as appropriate for submission to *JS&T* as manuscripts relating to tourism where sport is the prime purpose. *JS&T* also covers wider aspects of the relationship between sport and tourism, such as policy partnerships between sport and tourism agencies or the role of tourism in sports development, and is interested in manuscripts that bring perspectives traditionally associated with the tourism area to the study of sport, and vice-versa.

All manuscripts published in *JS&T* are double-blind peer reviewed by accomplished scholars in the subject/topic area of the manuscript and in the disciplinary or methodological approach used. The standard for publication in *JS&T* is that the paper must make a clear contribution substantively, theoretically or methodologically, to the body of knowledge relating to the relationship between sport and tourism.

Instructions for Authors

Submission

Authors should submit manuscripts electronically in MS Word format to the JS&T Editorial Office at JSAT@canterbury.ac.uk. If the manuscript contains any specially prepared artwork that cannot be submitted in Word format, then this should be submitted in an appropriate electronic format in a separate file to the above email address, with two accompanying hardcopies to be sent to Professor Mike Weed, Journal of Sport & Tourism, Department of Sport Science, Tourism and Leisure, Canterbury Christ Church University, Canterbury, Kent, CT1 1QU, UK.

All articles will be read by the Editor and an Associate Editor, and if deemed relevant and of a sufficient standard, they will be anonymously reviewed by at least two reviewers. Submission of a paper to *JS&T* will be taken to imply that it presents original, unpublished work, not under consideration for publication elsewhere. By submitting a manuscript, the authors agree that the copyright for their article is transferred to the Publisher if and when the article is accepted for publication. The copyright covers the exclusive rights to reproduce and distribute the article, including reprints, photographic reproductions, microfilm or any other reproduction of similar nature, and translations.

The manuscript

Submissions should be in English, typed in double spacing, with generous side margins, on one side of A4 or American standard size paper. Articles should normally be up to 8000 words in length (please contact the Editor if you would like to submit a longer manuscript), accompanied by an abstract, which must not exceed 250 words, setting out the main findings of the article. Please also include five or six keywords, preferably words that do not already appear in the title of the article. The Editor reserves the right to return the manuscript if it is not submitted in the required format. Sexist language should be avoided, and jargon or specialized language should be avoided where possible. Statistics are acceptable but must be explained in simple terms. Reference can be made to texts.

Tables, figures and illustrations

These should not be inserted throughout the main text of the manuscript, but should each be on a separate page at the end of the manuscript after the references. The approximate position in the text for each table, etc. should be indicated on a separate line in the manuscript.

Illustrations will be reduced in reproduction to a suitable size for the Journal and the lettering should be sized with this in mind.

References

Identify all references to books, monographs, articles and other sources, at an appropriate point in the main text, by citing the author's last name, year of publication, and pagination where appropriate, all within parentheses. Specify subsequent citations of the same source similarly; do not use 'ibid.', 'op.cit.' or 'loc.cit.'.

If the author's name is in the text, use only the year of publication in parentheses, e.g. Swart (2000). If the author's name is not in the text, include both the author's name and year of publication separated by a comma within the parentheses, e.g. (Weed, 2005). Pagination follows year, e.g. (Green, 2001: 9-10). With dual authorship give both names: for three or more use 'et al.', e.g. (Hinch and Higham, 2003) and (Turco et al., 2002). If there is more than one reference to the same author and year, distinguish between them by use of the letters 'a', 'b', etc. attached to the year of publication, e.g. (Getz, 2003a). A series of references should be enclosed within a single pair of parentheses, separated by semicolons, e.g. (Delpy-Neirotti, 2003; Swarbrooke, 2000; Urry, 2002).

Reference list

List all entries cited in the text, or any other items used to prepare the manuscript, alphabetically by author and year of publication in a separate, headed, reference section. Please follow the examples given:

Footnotes

These should be kept to a minimum, numbered consecutively in the text and placed, starting on a new page, at the end of the main text but before the references.
