Displayed quotations	Double quotes. Between quotation marks, followed by reference including page number, e.g. "CRAS can constitute a major advance for the practice of balancing input-output tables" (Lenzen et al., 2009, p. 18).
Lists	Bulleted or numbered, in line with typescript. Second and further lines aligned with first character of first line after bullet or number.
Equations	Equations should be numbered (using Arabic numerals) if reference is made to them in the main text. Scalars should be represented by lowercase italics a_{ij} , vectors should be indicated in bold lowercase symbols \mathbf{f} and matrices should be denoted by bold capitals \mathbf{A} . Diagonal matrices should be indicated by a hat \hat{X} and primes indicate transposed matrices or column vectors \mathbf{v}' .

Spelling preferences	American/British spelling. One or the other in an article
Punctuation	Initials (e.g. US, NJ, BBC) do not have full points between them. For names of article authors and in references, no space between initials (J.P. Smith, Smith, J.P. or Smith JP depending on reference style). Single quotes (double within)
Dashes	Spaced en rules for parenthetical dashes Use en rule between spans of numbers (e.g. 20–40), including page numbers in references
Numbers and units	Numbers: spell out one to nine, then 10, 1000, 10,000 10% (except at start of sentence) Units: follow author
Dates	4 October 2005 in the twenty-first century in the 1970s
Editorial	EDITORIAL (as title) If editorial has a title, use EDITORIAL (section heading) Title of editorial Editor Name <i>Affiliation if wanted</i>

Reference Style	References References should be indicated in the typescript by giving the author's name, with the year of publication in parentheses, for instance with (Leontief, 1966). If several papers by the same author and from the same year are cited, a, b, c, etc. should be put after the year of publication, for instance with (Miernyk, 1979a; 1979b). The references should be listed in full at the end of the paper in the following standard forms. Titles of journals should not be abbreviated. Books, monographs: Leontief, W. (1966) <i>Input-Output Economics</i> . New York, Oxford University Press. Multi-author volumes: Fontela, E. (2004) Leontief and the Future of the World Economy. In: E. Dietzenbacher and M.L. Lahr (eds.) <i>Wassily Leontief and Input-Output Economics</i> . Cambridge UK, Cambridge University Press, 30-46. Journal articles: Rose, A. and W.H. Miernyk (1989) Input-Output Analysis: The First Fifty Years. <i>Economic Systems Research</i> , 1, 229-271. Unpublished papers, reports: Stone, R. (1976) Major Accounting Problems for a World Model (Paper presented at the Working Seminar on Global Opportunities and Constraints for Regional Development, Harvard University, Cambridge MA).
